Coin in the Spotlight – 1875-S Branch Mint Proof Double Dime

In June 1875, a new coin was minted in San Francisco. The new coin was a *double dime*, a twenty-cent piece. What is clear is that a handful of special coins were minted, most likely as presentation pieces to commemorate the new denomination. What isn't clear, however, is how many were made. There is no record of these coins, as they were just included in the normal mint reports along with all of the coins struck for circulation. Because San Francisco did not make proof coins for sale to the public, these coins are controversial. But the coins' characteristics speak for themselves.

Today, there are between 7 and 9 known, and the best of them compare very favorably with Philadelphia proofs. The finest is graded Proof 64 Cameo, and at least one other is Proof 63. But some of them are impaired in some way. A couple of purported branch mint proofs are harshly cleaned and may be well-struck circulation strikes (with their original surfaces long gone and thus unable to be assessed). Research still continues on these most unusual coins, with a recent discovery of a second reverse die being utilized for some of them. A rich area for additional investigation.
