Coin in the Spotlight: 1793 “Strawberry Leaf” Large Cent

The Wreath cent of 1793 is a widely-available and highly sought one-year type coin (along with the more-famous Chain cent). Much more available than the Chains, the Wreath cents have a sprig of three leaves between the date and the bust of Liberty. However, a single obverse die mysteriously has an unexplained cluster of four trefoil (three-lobed) leaves instead, somewhat resembling the leaves of a strawberry plant. Nobody knows why this one obverse die was made differently than all the rest, and it was actually paired with two different reverse dies. The image at right shows the Strawberry Leaf cent, along with the inset that illustrates the normal leaves for the Wreath Cent

The Strawberry Leaf obverse must have been used for a very short time, as there are just 4 examples known. The pictured coin is the finest known by far. It is the most highly prized of all large cents. This example, graded PCGS VG10, recently sold for \$660,000.
